The overall objective of this course is to introduce students to a software suite that aggregates cloud based business analytics, app development, and low-code software solutions in order to equip them with practical knowledge of business oriented mobile application development, processes automation, virtual agents and reports preparations.

### DESCRIPTION AND GRADING CRITERIA OF EACH ASSIGNMENT

The course overall assessment and final grade involves 3 tasks, which are described below:

1. **Pre-Course work** will count for the **22%** of the final grade. Written analysis about a low-code solutions appliance in business operation. The specifications about the report to be delivered will be assigned till the middle of June. The students should present their analysis to the class during the second half of the first lecture.
2. **Practical assignments** will count for the **48%** of the final mark (there will be **12** assignments in total). The course is practice driven, therefore students are expected to provide finalized assignments after each session. Presenting accomplished assignment later than indicated in the 'due date' column, reduces its 10-point grade by the number of days being late.
3. A two-hours **exam**, which will include open and multiple-choice questions on the topics discussed during the sessions, mostly from 'key points' at the end of each chapter. Exam will count for the **30%** of the final mark.



Students must score for all 3 tasks of the semester (practical assignments, midterm exam, individual homework report) at the specified time (see, *Weekly course content*).

## **RETAKE POLICY**

Retake examination (30 %). If the final exam grade is lower than the minimum required, students must retake the exam, which will include all the topics covered along the course. Accumulative grades obtained for other assignments still count for the final grading. The retake will consist of a written report on a topic which will be sent by e-mail in 5 working days after the final exam. This written report must be submitted in 20 calendar days after the final exam; the weight of the retake is 35%. Retake reports cannot be rewritten. The course is designed to encourage active participation and attendance. The pre-coursework, homework and final exam are meant to check assimilation of theoretical content as well as to test knowledge application.
